3. PROFILE OF SKILLS AND COMPETENCIES

Mine workers are skilled workers who mine (win), transport and process mineral resources, mined rock, soil, etc. by means of movable mechanisms, technical supplies and mining equipment in concentrating plants and loading complexes.

Mine workers perform underground mining and quarrying or work in other similar fields of activity, e.g. build underground constructions, foundations, roads and tunnels.

The tasks of mine workers include drilling rock massif, removing the cover of mineral resources, preparation of blasting operations, winning with the use of a combine, supporting the mining area and installing lighting devices, supply cables, water extraction pumps and, if required, ventilation pipes and/or barriers.

More specific tasks of mine workers depend on the technology employed in the company.

Mine worker of level 4 works independently or as a team member. He/she performs tasks in ordinary situations and is responsible for his/her work results.

Mine workers specialise in:

- 1) underground drifting and stoping in workings, shafts and tunnels;
- 2) quarrying in open mining areas.

A mine worker specialised in underground work may perform underground electrical and metal work, if he/she has acquired the relevant special skills in an in-service training.

Mandatory competencies

- Transporting mined rock
- Auxiliary work of excavation operations
- Assembly of mining equipment
- Maintenance and repair of mining equipment

Competencies related to specialisation

- Underground drifting and stoping
- Quarrying

Optional competencies

- Underground electrical and metal work
